Had Nothing to Live For.

"One of Thaw's letters read in court this morning, which directed Longfellow in financial transactions, ended with: 'I have nothing to live for.' This letter was written after he had heard Evelyn's story in Paris. Another letter was written to Evelyn in America, in which he said he believed her hypnotized, but the letter continued: 'I know it's not true. She did not recall signing a check, because I went to Hummel's office. Thaw said it looked like blackmail to him.'"
