Milwaukee Wis Oct 10th 1859

My dear Father & Mother,

It is now along time since I have written to you, but you must not think that we have forgotten you or the old homestead, for not a day passes but that we are talking of you & all the friends we left in the East, but our daily cares & a spirit of Procrastination has kept me from ^{writing} before. We have all been blessed with an unusual share of good health for the past year, Giles grows fast, is quite a large boy & says that next summer he intends to visit you all, I hope we shall be able to send him, so that he will not forget the pleasant home we once had in B. We are very pleasantly situated this year since May 1. we have a good brick house in a block of 5 houses with neighbors aplenty, we have a front yard of 20x16 feet, just large enough for a flower bed in the center & well turfed all around, in the rear we have a yard 20 by 13 feet with woodhouse, well, cistern &c, large enough for quite a garden, which we shall have made into one, if we keep it another year, we have to pay \$200. rent, this year, last year we had to pay \$250, the house was not as good as this one, we are in hopes to get one next year for \$150.

 when I first came here it was almost impossible
 to get a house for any price, but last season they
 built some three thousand houses & this year as many
 more & the consequence is rents are continually falling,
 The crops are all very heavy with the exception of
Potatoes, - they are worth almost as much as wheat,
 I pay for good flour \$4.50. for potatoes 50 cents per bush.
 If I ever get able I shall send you some flour so
 that you can see what kind of Bread we have in this
 country, the weather now, since we have got over the "Equinoctial"
 is very pleasant, the falls here are very pleasant, but the
 Springs are Mud, Muddy, Muddiest, of all places except
Chicago, I have written Arnold 3 letting to his one. I shall
 write him again next week, with love to all, not forgetting
 anyone. I am as ever your affectionate Frank W. S.
